# **TCVCC General Meeting**

April 22, 2023
Hosted by John and Ann DeLisa

Club members met up at the Wells Fargo Bank in Port St. Lucie for the drive up to the Vero Beach Museum of Art. A large number of members drove their classics, which was nice to see. After a nice drive up Indian River Blvd and the beach road,

we arrived at the museum and started our tour. We had 3 docents so we were separated into groups to make it more enjoyable.

The exhibit we had come to see was Rolling Sculpture: Streamlined Art Deco Automobiles and Motorcycles. Beginning in the 1930s, the confluence of aircraft design, the sleek shapes of fast railroad lo-



comotives, advanced highways like the German Autobahns, the Italian Autostradas, and the Pennsylvania Turnpike, along with epoch-changing global events like the 1939 New York City World's Fair, encouraged automotive designers and engineers to style truly streamlined cars.

The first car in the exhibit was a 1925/1934 Rolls-Royce Phantom Aerodynamic Coupe from the Petersen Automotive Museum. The reason for the dual year designation is that it began as a 1925 Rolls-Royce Phantom I, but in 1984, it received a unique body built by Jonekheere of Belgium. To me, the most unique feature was the round door. Hard to see in the picture.

Another incredible vehicle was the 1937
Lincoln-Zephyr Coupe. This car was designed by John Tjaarda, a designer at
Briggs Manufacturing Company. This car,
with its low silhouette, tapered, teardrop
shaped fuselage, and skirted rear wings
was the most successful American streamlined car in the 1930's.





Then there was this quirky little bug. This is a 1936 Stout Scarab. Henry Ford purchased Stout Engineering in 1924 and Stout's aircraft design evolved into the Ford Tri-Motor aircraft. Stout then designed this vehicle with it's rear-mounted flathead Ford V-8 and 3 speed manual transmission. A custom transfer case and a six-row chain powered the rear wheels. You'll notice all 4 wheels are

at the corners of the vehicle. You could say this was the forerunner of the minivan.

I'll leave you with one more very special vehicle. This is a 1937 Delahaye 135MS. This is a one-off roadster produced for especially for the 1937 Paris Auto Salon.

# Member Stories By Hal Wilson

My fascination with the 4-door (fordor) Thunderbird began when I was 16 living in Miami and going with my dad to look for a new family car for my mom. At that time, she was driving a 63 Chevy Impala SS which was a hardtop coupe. I still can't figure out why they ever bought a 2-door car with three boys clamoring in and out of the backseat all the time. Incidentally, I vividly remember getting my fingers slammed in the door lots of times. Ouch! So my dad finally decides it's time for a 4-door car with 3 fast growing teenage sons.

I remember walking into the ford showroom with him and there in the center of the floor sat a brand new Thunderbird 4-door Landau. It was painted Diamond Blue with a dark blue full vinyl top. (For that year, Diamond Blue was exclusive to the Thunderbird and the Continental.) That car was entirely new for that year and I had never seen anything like it before. I was taken at first sight. The rearward hinged (suicide) doors were the coolest thing I'd ever seen. I pleaded with dad to buy that car but he didn't. He was a hard bargainer and knowing him he probably walked out of the showroom being \$100 apart in the deal. Anyway, dad ended up buying a Buick Electra 225. Bummer. I never forgot that car and spent many many years visualizing owning one someday.

When I got to the age where I could contemplate finding one and buying it I searched Hemmings website daily for seems like years before low-and-behold an ad appears for a 67 Landau in the same color combination I remembered. The car was then located in New Jersey and had been owned by the same family since new. The car was bought new by the Service Manager at a Ford dealership in Ft. Myers Florida and the car remained there until the couple passed at which time their daughter took the car home with her to New Jersey where it was used infrequently for special occasions. Having a daughter entering dental school they decided to part with the family treasure and they listed it in Hemmings Motor News. I found the car (it was meant for me) so I contacted the sellers. I arraigned for a vehicle inspection and the report came back

that the car was very rust and other than nudents the car was in rior was in very nice minimal wear. I flew to (great folks) and parted with the car reit home to Jensen mained in touch with



sound with no body merous dings and great shape. The intecondition and showed NJ and met the sellers bought the car. They luctantly and I shipped Beach. I have rethe sellers ever since

and they are delighted that I planned to restore their family heirloom to its original glory.

I bought it in December 2018 and after I got the car back to Florida my plan was to locate a shop that could fix the broken stuff on the car, repair the dings and dents and then maybe repaint the car. I had zero experience with older cars. My cars are all new and I never keep them longer than a few years so I had no idea where to begin. I started asking around and ended up contacting Paul Grasso who owns Grasso's Garage in Pt. Salerno which is about 6 miles from my house.



He runs a smaller shop maybe working on less than ten cars at a time. He came to my house and looked at the Thunderbird and said he would be delighted to work on the car - eventually. His shop was full at the time so I waited until April 2019 before Paul gave me the okay to bring the car to the shop.

So on April 3, 2019 I dropped the car off at his shop and spent quite a while talking to him about the significance of the car to me and how I envisioned it to look and operate when it was fin-

ished. I gave him a very lengthy list of things I wanted done.

At this stage, I never contemplated nor considered a complete frame-off restoration. It wasn't discussed. Paul evaluated the condition of the car thoroughly and eventually called me and asked if I had ever thought about doing a frame-off restoration. He was concerned that if he fixed everything I had on the list (which was going to be costly) I



would end up unhappy

with the resulting car. He asked me to consider doing it right. I thought about it and decided to go for it and told him to proceed. Make the car new again. I had no idea what I was getting into! It ended up being multi-year project and cost me way more than I ever imagined I would spend on the car.

Once the disassembly of the car began we discovered the car had repaired damage to the left rear quarter of the car. The fact that the car was originally owned by the dealer service manager may explain why the car was carefully repaired the way it was. This created the first challenge. Restore the quarter panel or try to find a suitable replacement? We decided to search for a replacement and we were fortunate to lo-



cate a one in California and we had it shipped to Florida. Ford produced the 4-door model from 67-71. However, the 67 model was unique in many ways.

This ended up creating more than a few problems because many interior trim parts were not interchangeable with the 68-71 cars. Some parts were simply not available and had to be fabricated from

scratch. The next challenge was the

factory air conditioner. Once it was disassembled we discovered most of the fan assembly, evaporator housing and the adjacent firewall was completely rusted away. We ended up having to fabricate most of the firewall assembly and motor housing from scratch. The factory A/C would never have operated properly had we not restored the entire car.

As everyone who has ever done this before knows, restoration is a long process. And I mean really long. There were many challenges and problems. We overcame almost every obstacle except one. Door and window weatherstripping for the 4-door Thunderbirds is not available. Anywhere. And that ended up being my one and only disappointment with the project. After replac-



ing and/restoring virtually every part on the car we were faced with no suitable solution for the weatherstripping problem. And as everyone knows, functional weatherstripping is essential.

Fortunately Paul kept the original weatherstripping and with a lot of TLC we were able to reuse most of it. Unfortunately we had to use alternative weatherstripping in many places which is a poor substitute for the original. After so many trials and tribulations the car was finally delivered to me on August 24, 2022. I'm excited beyond words.
