



### Spring Forward to Victory Show- March 9, 2025- A Behind the Scenes Look

Here are my observations of the behind the scenes operations that made this show successful. I should note right off the bat that what applied to this show does not necessarily apply to the Cool Show which is a different format. These observations are in the event that we wanted to put on another show like this in the future.

Firstly it could never be done without the help of a myriad of people who stepped up at various levels to guarantee success. It is likely I will miss one or two people but here goes my best effort.

Denny Dahle, Sally Franklin, Larry Atkins, Curt Francisco, Frank Loverso, Dick Hoffmann, Mike Searle, Sandee Searle, Rosemary Rayman, Mike Franze, Diane Franze, Richie Arnone, Maryann Arnone, Don Jones, Scott MacGillivray, Dennis Radford, Linda Radford, Hank Peters, Rick Volkart, Chris Levy, Russ Caterinicchio, Fil Ferrauto, Nancy Ferrauto, Joann Smith, and Lynn Sullivan.

The final car count was 151 cars paid which included 48 Pontiacs. Without parking in the aisles we might



have been able to hold 2 or 3 more cars. We were **SOLD OUT.** 

We hit the ground running with the setup crew led by Curt Francisco arriving on site even before I did. In a short time, the tents were erected, the tables set up, the signs placed along the road, and we were ready for business.

As this show had no pre-registration, it was unknown how many cars would show up. Although I was going for simplistic, I think a show like this needs pre-paid registration to hedge against poor weather. However, I think the price variance from pre-pay to day-of-show pay would have to be significant to reward those that pre-pay. Many people wait to see what the weather is like before they decide to attend.

By placing registration deeper into the entrance, it prevented cars from being backed up on the road. Rick Volkart directed

traffic in case anyone was not sure about where to go. Also, as there was only one registration tent, there was no confusion on where to go. Participants simply paid their \$20, parked and came back to fill out registration forms and dash placards. Registration – You guys knocked it out of the park. At the end there was a registration sheet for all 103 cars. We should probably build at least an email database of the folks we don't have already.

(Pontiac clubs did theirs differently, with a sheet tracking registrations and this unfortunately missed a portion of their entrants. (They did not receive any portion of the registration \$\$)

Hats off to the parking committee on a brilliant job of parking similar cars near each other. This included the Pontiac section, the TCVCC section, the Stuart Corvette Club, and the Palm Beach A's. I made the mistake of not mentioning that cars should have fire extinguishers to be judged on the flyer. I doubled down on that mistake by only asking to get 12 for sale (we probably could have sold 25) I tripled down by not having an announcement made to let people know they could borrow their neighbors fire extinguisher. I grossly underestimated participation and that led to challenges. With all the free shows and cruise ins that this area offers, I was sure that 50-60 Non Pontiacs, and 30 Pontiacs would be all there could possibly be.



As a result we purchased 20 trophies. 20 trophies for 103 cars is too

light. In addition although simple is good, there probably needs to be some classification to break them down. Stock, Modified, Street Rod, Modern muscle. Something of the sort to create a fair competition.

The Pontiac club had 2 classes- Stock and Modified which worked for those 48 cars. They used a judging sheet almost exactly like ours, but there was stock and modified judging sheet, and each was a different color. That was genius, as when it came time to sort them, we could put them together by color, and count how many were in each class and then prorate the trophies. In their case, stock got 14 trophies, and modified got 6.

It would probably have been helpful to have an announcement to tell participants to put their judging sheet on the windshield either behind or next to the placard. In many instances the judging sheet was not seen or in a car with the windows closed, with the owner absent. As we don't want to touch the car, this makes it challenging.

In the case of Non Pontiac judging, my underestimation of expected cars was compounded and made for a long day of judging. I cannot thank the following enough- Scott MacGillivray, Linda Radford, Dennis Radford, Curt Franciso, Chris Levy and Frank Lo Verso. I put you guys in a terrible situation to have to grind through 100 cars. In retrospect we probably needed 10 more people to make 2 more

teams and split the classes as





mentioned above so that each group only had 33 cars. Even that is a lot!

Mike Searle and Rosemary Rayman manned the Club Membership tent. I think we signed up a couple members? I'm not sure about that.

Music by Bob Shurts of the museum seemed to be to

everyone's liking. It could be heard out by the road, and he did an excellent job of being a DJ. More information could have been relayed for him to broadcast throughout the day as he was open to that.



The museum did the cooking and from what I understand, the hot



dogs were excellent. When I met with the board on the Monday

prior to the meeting, Ray (President) suggested that we could give out free meals (hot dog, chips and soda) to show participants. 1 per car. (a \$5 value). Between the free meals and sold meals they ran out of food. This was not their fault. I could not predict attendance, and I saw many people get the free meal and augment it with 2 extra hot dogs. In the future, if they can grill chicken for sandwiches and burgers, I think they will be more than adequate going forwards and alleviate us chasing a food vendor and make themselves some money. The Road to Victory museum counted 157 guests, and were very happy with that. They spent \$370 and took in \$732. This included the \$\$ donated by the Snow Cone vendor (\$25), and the  $\frac{1}{2}$  of the 50-50 that was won by a car show participant. I don't know if there were any other donations.

The 50-50 was done before the trophies. That seemed to work as I think most ticket purchasers were participants. Thank you Nancy Ferrauto for leading this up. I recollect seeing Lynn Sullivan helping, and I'm sure there was someone else.

Trophy presentation went well (except for my poor handwriting) I should have asked Mike Searle to do this as he is far better at it than I am. Dave Brown did an excellent job of announcing and splitting between Pontiacs and Non Pontiacs.



In retrospect I should have asked him to mention that there were 2 shows going on concurrently. Someone mentioned that he thought that the Pontiacs got too many trophies, so I explained how it worked. We also should have introduced President Denny Dahle and President Bob Goebel and thanked the respective clubs that showed up. Trophy plaques were nice, and Richie Arnone got them from the same place we got the dash plaques at a very reasonable price.

I feel we provided an excellent value for the money. The museum is excited to have us back in November 2025, and hope to rally the club of military vehicles to participate.

The TCVCC has a running competition with IR-RAACA for the last few years, and we usually win quite handily. In 2024 we had 18 cars entered in their show, as opposed to their 5 or 6 in our Cool Cars Show. There is no prize, but it is a nice opportunity for bragging, as they have us beat in every other category. Our rally point was the usual Elliot museum which allows for an easy ride up A1A to Ft Pierce. Bob Sees had prewarned us that there was major construction at US1 to cross the north bridge so we opted for a different route down Old Dixie in Ft Pierce. 
