Car show season is in full swing. There are many shows each weekend. Get those prized pieces of iron out there & enjoy while the weather is near perfect. Dec 6 Keiser U in Tradition, Dec 13 at the PSL Civic Center, Dec 20 at Martin County High School. Of course there is the weekly cruise ins, Jan 10 at the Elks Club on Lennard

This year has flown by. Another COOL Show in the books. A huge thank you to all members who helped make it a huge success. Chris Levy & I met at the Military Museum Thur. Nov 20 & presented a check in the amount of \$1000.00 to them. They were very grateful.

Last installment of my racing years. I moved on to a Super Late Model team in PSL. It was a traveling show. The Sun Belt Super Series. It was the most fun I've had racing & the most work. One year it was 660 hrs.

We had 2 cars owned by Pete Willoughby & driven by his son Barry. Me and another guy were all we had. Barry had success in the pavement modified winning the series championship. Running a super late model was a totally different ball game. Pete asked me to be on the team when he saw my dedication while racing in the Hooters series. So basically, I was the tire specialist, fuel & anything else that needed done. We built 2 cars from bare chassis up. One had a Danny O'Connell engine & the other had a Rahilly 685 hp. engine. The Rahilly from RahMoc racing, car # 75 driven by Neil Bonnett. Butch Mock, Bob & Dick Rahilly are friends of Pete from Miami. The Allisons were also from Miami before moving to Hueytown, Ala.

As stated, it was a traveling show which got old quickly. Anytime Pete would call & say we are leaving at a certain time & pack a bag which meant it was an overnighter. We ran at racetracks in Fla., Ga. & S.C. from 3/4 mile to 1/4 mi. Lakeland was my favorite at 3/4 of a mi. It is not there anymore. Other tracks in Fla. included Bronson, Ocala, Orlando, New Smyrna, (many times for speed weeks) Punta Gorda, St. Augustine, Inverness, Sebring twice. Cordele, Ga. Hardeeville, S.C twice. One weekend there was a Triple Crown race, 3 tracks in 3 days: New Smyrna, Orlando & Punta Gorda, which was rained out. I found the showers at Inverness & came back to the pit area before the race smelling like I had not been at the racetrack all day. Took some ribbing for that antic.

One time at New Smyrna during speed weeks, on the last lap of practice, a car spun off turn 2. Barry spun the car out to miss him & a New York guy named Larry Galenas came out of turn 2 full blast & wiped out the whole right side of the car right in front of us. You know it is a bad day when they bring the car back on 2 wreckers. We were done & came home to rebuild it. Another time at New Smyrna, on a restart, a guy named Robert Yoho stabbed the brake instead of the clutch. A large mess ensued. The race shop had all the equipment one needed to build a race car. Mig, Tig, 8' sheet metal brake, box brake, welders, mill, lathe, bead roller, air tools & more. It was a treat to work there. We even made our own A-arms for the car to get the right geometry on the front end. I would try to change it often after practice while reading the tire temps to get as much tire patch on the pavement as possible. Stagger on an oval track is right to left, in road racing (Sebring) it's front to back.

We had highs & lows with the #74 Pennzoil Racing Chevy. Finished 3 rd. at Lakeland once, twice was a 3rd place at Sebring & a 4th in Ocala. A 3 rd. in S.C. once.

The right side getting wiped off at New Smyrna, getting T-boned at Lakeland on the 1st lap of practice & blowing up the engine last lap of practice at Sebring were the lows. We put it in the trailer, came back to the race shop in PSL, worked all night, called Char & she brought us pizza. Char went back with us early in the am & we finished 3rd. Key to road racing is STAY ON COURSE!

We finished 6th, 5th & 4th - 3 yrs in a row in the SBSS & we were a small team with not a lot of \$\$\$. The Pennzoil sponsor had a 2-seater show car & a Thunder Roadster. Had the chance to make some laps in both at New Smyrna. The 2-seater was a tank. Much preferred the Roadster. It was an Indy-style car.

Barry spent 5 yrs. going through an engineering school in Orlando. He almost signed on with a NASCAR team Hendrick Motorsports but made the wise decision to be employed by Boeing Aircraft in Wash. state. He is the chief engineer on the main center section of 777 Dream Liner. He is doing very well & just received both race cars he drove back in the day.

With the help of the race shop building the hot rod truck was way much easier. That was a decade long build as I was side tracked racing for a few yrs. Pete treated me kindly. He always paid for my entrance fee any overnight stays & dinner if we were out of town.

Pic is of a custom designed & fabricated tire roller. The usual roller had 4 rollers on the horizontal. After a while it would break the tip off the thin tire tape measure as it passed over the rollers. So, I made this one on opposing angles to eliminate the problem.

We had a small contest at the race shop one Saturday. Loser bought lunch. Guess how much the pit/ crash cart weighs? We got the scales out, jacked it up & set it down on them. Do not remember who lost but the pit cart weighed over 1600 lbs.! Good times at the race shop. The engine room had a TV so we kept tabs on any race that was on while we were working on the race cars

While racing prep, going to the tracks, racing & returning home also had a business to attend to Strictly Custom. Furniture restoring, repairing, refinishing & custom

cabinet construction. I was working hard & playing hard and contracted a severe case of pneumonia in 2001. Almost killed me. After 3 hrs. & \$3500 in the emergency ward (down 3 liters on liquid) I was feeling pretty good. It took 6 months to regain full strength.



JDM 1993 Mazda RX-7 FD3S Series 6 Type RB (Bathurst Tribute) 3rd Generation 1.3-liter 13B-REW Engine

During the mid-1970's while I was pursuing my Ph.D. at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute studying statistical modelling and research methodologies, I became acquainted with W. Edwards Deming's pioneering work in the development and practical applications of statistical quality control in engineering and manufacturing. Most curiously, I learned that post-World War II Japan had earnestly embraced Deming's ideas and successfully applied them to their automotive designs and manufacturing. Their applied statistical quality control together with the regimented work ethic of Japanese engineers and auto workers became the impetus behind the astounding success of Toyota, Datsun, Honda and Mazda in dominating automobile sales in the USA especially in the aftermath of the 1973-1974 OPEC oil embargo.

I always had a keen interest in the simplicity, compactness and surprising power of the rotary engine. While the automotive giants had tried to develop and build a durable rotary engine, Mazda was the only company that successfully designed, manufactured and sold various rotary cars and trucks throughout the global marketplace. Compared to Toyota and Honda, Mazda was a boutique car company, but always innovative and always ahead of the curve. Mazda's famous rotary-powered Cosmo sports car proved that when it was introduced in 1967, and later successfully marketed in Japan as the luxurious Eunos Cosmo until 1995. Then Mazda, the former cork manufacturer from Hiroshima, stunned the motorsports world in 1991 by winning the prestigious 24-hour Le Mans in Category 2 (Car #55) running a 4-rotor naturally aspirated 787B engine, conquering Mercedes, Jaguar and Peugeot.

With all these insights considered and ignoring the popular notion that Mazda rotary engines are notoriously unreliable, I began my search for a Japanese Domestic Market (JDM) 1993 RX-7 combing the world wide web and reading every article I could find detailing the third generation Rotary Experiment (RX) 7.

I was driven by the uniquely flawless and timeless design of this car! In early October 2019, I finally located a vehicle presented in auction at G-7 Crown Trading Co., Ltd. in Kawasaki, Japan and imported under the "25-Year Rule" by Kuruma Imports, LLC of Doral, Florida. The CARVX report showed a 1993 RX-7 FD3S RB Efini trim painted in Sunburst Yellow (Mazda paint code HZ), certified mileage at 52,729 kilometers with a solid rating of 4 on the official auction sheet. Except for aftermarket 18-inch 3-part Gartmaier wheels, a MOMO "Monte Carlo" steering wheel and an aftermarket exhaust, this manual five-speed two-rotor, two-sequential turbochargers motor was all stock. No accidents were reported and there was no BONDO or filler detected anywhere on the sheet metal. Moreover, this car had two sets of keys, all the original Mazda Efini RX-7 factory manuals as well as a complete set of original service tickets! I took possession of this magnificent example on October 9, 2019.

What's all the excitement about? JDM RX-7s are made especially for the Japanese home market and present different trims and performance characteristics not available in the United Staes due to Federal safety and strict emissions regulations. That a JDM car is a right-side driver is the most conspicuous design feature which gets the most "mouths open wide-eyed" looks from other drivers on the road. My Series 6 RX-7 has other significant features not available in the USA (i.e., kph speedometer, no airbags, no pre-catalytic converter on the downpipe, the 2+2 rear seating, and the special edition Efini luxury brand).

JDM 1993 Mazda RX-7 FD3S Series 6 Type RB (Bathurst Tribute)
Continued...

Owning a vintage JDM RX-7 is an adventure on several levels. The first adventure begins with the restoration and overhauling of the entire vehicle. While my RX-7's interior and exterior were in excellent condition requiring minimal to moderate refurbishing to bring into near-new condition, and with the rotary engine showing 52,729 certified kilometers at auction, I decided at the onset to focus on a total overhaul of the engine, keeping it as stock as possible by limiting modifications to assure reliability, performance and longevity.

JDM RX-7s are exotic front-mid engine, very highperformance, high-revving sports cars which need to be broken in properly the first 1000 kilometers when brand new, and subsequently driven spiritedly at high speeds and RPMs at the proper times. Moreover, oil and coolant levels are super-critical for a sequentially turbocharged engine that naturally runs very hot. Because Japanese roads are primarily limited to two-lanes in high-density communities, many of these imported low-kilometer JDM RX-7s were driven at moderate speeds and with plenty of idle time. Such driving may promote high carbon deposits on the rotors and the ignition side of the rotary housing which could result in detonation and destruction of the apex seals under load conditions. Excessive idling can cause high operating temperatures potentially compromising the rotary housing side seals. In short, a low kilometer engine doesn't necessarily guarantee a good engine; since how the new motor was properly broken in, driven and subsequently diligently maintained remains unknown. In short, the buyer has to be aware and ready to expect surprises.

Accordingly, over a period of three years, my JDM RX-7 engine, drive train, suspension and exhaust were overhauled by Cameron Worth of Pettit Racing/Excellent Performance in Riviera Beach, Florida. (Cameron "Cam' is a former GT racing champion with his #75 RX-7 in the Rolex 24 as well as setting time trial records at Homestead-Miami Speedway.)

The new motor was hand-built and autographed by Cameron Worth with new rotors using Mazda cast iron apex seals, new rotary housings and forged eccentric shaft. The motor was blue printed, balanced and street ported yielding more than 300 brake horsepower for a vehicle weighing 2700 pounds. The factory ECU was kept intact. The vacuum lines, relays and solenoids were replaced with new units as needed; the so-called "rats nest" was completely overhauled and retained; the sequential turbochargers were checked and retained. All other engine components were replaced or overhauled including the factory intercooler and air box. The air pump was removed, and a new aluminum powdercoated coolant swirl box was installed. A lightweight flywheel and Stage I Exedy rally clutch were installed. New Pettit Racing Stage II Trak Pro coil-overs, brakes, and a Magnaflow low restriction catalytic converter matched with a three-inch stainless steel Japanese Medallion exhaust system were installed. Finally, the restoration was finished with the complete refurbishing of the driver and passenger seats. The seats were rebolstered and newly upholstered with imported Italian black Alcantara suede with "Sunflower" 138 thread following the OEM patterns.

My 1993 JDM RX-7 is a time machine taking me back to an automotive era when cars demanded a connected and focused driver, period! No fancy tricks and options. Just raw rotary power and sounds of the turbo blow-off valves. I run my JDM RX-7 on weekends usually along scenic A1A and the Intracoastal Waterway's winding secondary roads in Martin and St. Lucie Counties enjoying the salty smell of the ocean breezes with my windows down or just chilling with a fully functioning air conditioner. The driving experience in a JDM RX-7 is an exhilarating adventure: a rigid low chassis and dampened suspension attacking the turns with instant smooth boosted linear power all the way up to the 9000 RPM redline, although the "sweet spot" is around 7500 RPMs. The modifications have been worthwhile, producing a car that has improved performance and reliability, plus the longevity that a Cam Worth built Pettit Racing rotary engine is famous for. JDM is "Just Damn Marvelous"!


Our November General Meeting


