Cars Under the Canopy

By Sally Franklin & Larry Atkins 1956 Nash Metropolitan Convertible

Hey Ya'll! Thought I'd share this story about one of our projects that we have been working on during the spring and summer. It's a long story because, frankly, I don't have much else to put in the newsletter!

As some of you might know, Larry and I took our Falcon to the AACA Show down in Miami at the end of February. Well, we had borrowed a trailer from Bob Elzin and took the falcon down in that. Now, we're not really into trailering cars to shows, but it was kinda nice to get there and not have to spend hours cleaning the car and detailing it. Not to mention driving a 50+ year old car all the way to Miami and back, worrying about flying rocks and shredded tires.

Anyway, when we got home, we were talking with Bob about trailers and he said he knew where one was that was pretty good and we could probably pick it up for a good price. So, early in March, we met Bob at a garage that, come to find out, is owned by another club member, Pete Bortnick. As we were walking to a storage area behind the shops, we walked by the open door of Pete's garage and there sat this cute little car. I looked at it and said, "that's so cute!",

and the man working on it (whom I later learned was Pete's ex-son-in-law, Lee) piped up and said "it's for sale".

Well, I told Larry and Bob to go on to look at the trailer and I would catch up. I started talking with Lee and he filled me in on the story of the little car and I kept asking questions and taking pictures. Lee started the car up, and she ran like a top. By then, Larry and Bob had returned from looking at the trailer and said I should go look at it. I did, but my mind was stuck on the little car and didn't see any potential for the trailer. Besides, the little car would

fit in the garage. Where would we store the trailer?

So, Larry looked the car over and had Lee start it up again. As before, she ran great. So, I told Lee I would have to do some research and I would get back with him. After a week of looking up information and talking about it, we decided it would be a fun project and could be done fairly economically. (Famous last words!)

We went for a test drive in it and I decided that Larry should drive, because the transmission was really difficult to shift and very iffy. It's three-on-the-tree and, since Larry has much more experience with those and needed to double clutch and play with the shifter to find any gear, I was content to ride along. That was scary enough, because there was really only one brake that was working. But it worked really well!

We worked a deal with the owner of the car and brought her home the second week in March and the adventure began. The first order of business was to get the brakes working properly. That required a little more research, because the car had parts from a newer model mixed in with original parts and that needed to be sorted out. We became very friendly with the Metropolitan Parts people. They were very helpful and shared information readily, and had most all the parts we would need to make the little car as good, or better, than new.



Eventually, the brakes were working pretty good. Next up, the transmission and shifter. This required a lot of tinkering and testing, but Larry persisted and finally got it to where you could be fairly certain that you were in the correct gear when you let the clutch out. I understand that this was a common ailment of these cars. Or should we call it a feature?

Somewhere in there, I decided she needed a bath. The convertible top, while it appeared to be fairly new, was covered with mold and the vinyl windows had gone yellow and brittle. I tried everything in the house, garage, and even bought some stuff from the

boat store, but I couldn't clear up the windows or stop the cracking. But the top itself cleaned up pretty good, even though the weather stripping was pretty rotten. That could wait until later.

While Larry was working on the shifting issue and we traced down some electrical gremlins named Lucas, we also starting looking at the cosmetics of the car. Obviously, the black paint job did not do the car justice, and had apparently been poorly applied, since the original coral red color showed through in many places. Most of the bright work needed polishing or replated, and some pieces just needed replaced.

We pulled out the interior and the carpet, because the car had that real musty



smell old cars get when they sit too long. After scraping out decades of dust and dirt, I cleaned and replaced what couldn't be cleaned and things were starting to look up.

After a few test drives, it was obvious the car was in need of suspension work. She had a distinct lean to the right and made very bad noises when going over bumps in the road. So, more parts to order.

While waiting on those parts, we heard about a Metropolitan that was sitting in a scrap yard. We went out to look and found a few parts that could help us out with our car. Armed with tools and Gatorade, we proceeded to pull what parts we could get off the car. It took a couple of trips, but we didn't leave much behind.





After a lot more work, we finally had the car running and driving fairly well. We decided it was time to think about the bodywork. We stripped the car of anything that could come off, loaded her up on a borrowed trailer, and hauled her to the body shop.



Can you tell which parts are from the donor car? Anyway, it took a while for us to come up with just the right color for her. We wanted to go as close to original as possible but with a little more pizzazz.

We went up and checked on progress pretty often and made a few design changes along the way. It was really fun to watch her go from a little shabby looking turtle to a whole new car.

After a lot of work, they finally got the first coat of color on and I was so excited! We decided to add the Wimbledon White strip at the bottom to break up the color a bit. It's not stock, but we like it. It took a few more weeks of work and then we got to bring her home so we could continue with the adventure.

Time to put all those pieces and parts back on. I'm glad Larry is such a stickler for detail and labeled everything! Then we tackled

the convertible top.

You know when it comes with instructions that start with "This replacement should not be attempted by non-professionals", you may be in for some fun.

We decided to give it a go anyway. I mean really, how hard can it be? (more famous last words) More parts and even some new tools to buy. Well, it took a while but we finally got it installed and it turned out pretty good. After replacing all the weather stripping and cleaning her up, it doesn't even leak, much.



After that, it was on to tackling a slight overheating issue. After replacing hoses, a thermostat, and water pump, Larry found the engine block to be full of crud and needed flushing. He worked on it for several days before getting the drain in the block cleared out and flushing the block. What a difference that made! There are still a few things to take care of as they come along, but now she is drivable and we have taken her out a few times. So much fun watching people react to her! Hope to get to drive her to one of our club meetings soon.
