2022 AACA Winter Nationals in Melbourne

Although I read my AACA Speedster magazine from cover to cover, I usually gloss over the portion that lists the National Shows, mostly because they are always in far-away places (for me) such as the Northeast, or on the rare occasion Tennessee or Georgia.

Last September, we had been returning from an overnight cruise and met with Dave Anspach who had a Master Editor award that had been awarded for Sally Franklin's newsletter efforts. When he presented her the award at our lunch stop, he also mentioned that the Cape Canaveral Region club would be hosting the 2022 Winter Nationals at the Muscle Car Museum in Melbourne.

We had gone to a show in Spring 2021 at the Museum that was an open show with over 500 cars, and it seemed like a great place for a National event. After kicking the idea around, we thought that it might be a nice show to attend, as it was a relatively easy drive, and the weather in February is quite good for outdoor car shows.

I had decided that instead of taking my 1964 GTO convertible that had gotten its first junior in 2014, that I would take my 1966 GTO that had never been entered in an AACA show before. Although it is mostly stock, it had aftermarket wheels on it for the first 10 years of its restored life. The tires on that car were 16 years old, and although the speeds on the trip would not exceed 50 mph for any length of time, I decided to bite the bullet and order new redline radials from Diamondback Radials. Once upon a time radials on cars that didn't come with them as original equipment meant a 10 point deduction by AACA judges per tire including the spare. I had a bias ply spare, and was pleased to learn from Joe Vicini that radials were now just a 2 point deduction.

I had the car on stands while the tires were being put on the rims at the local Pep Boys, so I decided to spend some time cleaning the undercarriage. The car had been a body off restoration in 2005, but the rear main seal had leaked and oil coated the leading surfaces of the cross member. There was plenty of cleaning to do, but everything had held up quite well. Now, although the old tires looked beautiful from the outside, it's only after I pulled them off that I noticed that the sidewall was coming off in chunks on the inside. Whew... glad I decided to get those new tires. I tightened up a loose fan belt, did some engine detailing and was ready to go.

After a couple of weekends of cleaning and polishing I was ready to call it a day. I removed all not stock items such as front license plate, plate frames, etc. Then I noticed a slight bit of coolant on the ground. Not good. Not more than a few drops, but enough to get my attention. Should I pour some "Bars" stop leak in there? I opted to take it out and get it nice and hot, and that seemed to cure the problem. Needless to say, I packed a gallon of water, and the stop leak along with my bucket of cleaning supplies.

Our rally point to leave for the show was the Elliot museum. There were 5 of us total going up on Friday, while others would be coming up later in the day, or the following day. Our group comprised of myself and Rosemary, Larry and Sally in their 1957 T bird, Ron and Barb in their 1968 Firebird convertible, Charlie and Sherry with their Buick stashed in a trailer, and Scott Bean with his AMX.

Off we went on a casual drive along the beach. I quickly realized that my radiator was doing as it should and temperatures stayed around 190. We pulled into our designated lunch spot, but were dismayed to see very few parking spaces available, but there were two together where Larry and I parked, and the others found nearby spaces. Charlie with the trailer had to go a little ways down to park.

The restaurant was accommodating and we were able to sit together. Midway through the meal Sally went to the cars and returned back to report that our two cars were under a power line and the local birds had used them for a toilet. "Covered in crap" she said. I thought she was exaggerating, but quickly learned that it was quite true. Oh well. Onwards to the host hotel we went. While Rosemary went to check in, Scott found a shady spot and I pulled in next to him. Sally and Larry joined us shortly.



I took the luggage etc upstairs and came back down to do some cleaning. Remember that gallon of water? I poured a third into my bucket and proceeded to give my car a cowboy bath. When the water got black from dirt, I emptied the bucket and started over. There were bird deposits everywhere. In the back seat, on the cowl, in the door jambs, on all upper surfaces. After 3 or 4 buckets worth of dirty water, I was done. Scott, Sally and Larrry were also cleaning their cars and in the end we were all satisfied with our efforts and moved the cars from under the shade tree to prevent a reoccurrence. Although we had gotten our room right away, the others had not, so we hung around the lobby for a while and set dinner for 5:30. We met at the bar at 5:00 and learned that the restaurant was not open, but they would still serve food at the bar. That worked out nicely, but suddenly the area was overrun by a private fundraiser of approximately 125 people. Their event had some tasty looking appetizers, but without an identifying lanyard, there was no treats for the AACA folks. We walked around the grounds and checked out some of the cars that would be in the show the next day, then turned in early as breakfast would be at 6:15, then off to the show at 7:00.

As we were only staying one night, we had to load everything up in the car. It was covered with dew, and I thought that would be helpful for me when I gave it another wipe down at the show. Three cars headed to the show field which was less than 4 miles from the hotel, and registration was quick. I was given number 157, or so I thought.. It was actually 151, and finally found my spot and pulled in. Thank goodness, I didn't have to fight with my manual steering. We unloaded and I proceeded to get the car in order, place my fire extinguisher by the wheel etc. The car looked as good as I could have hoped for, but I knew that there were many items that were not stock, so my expectations were not high that I could get a first junior, but maybe sneak in for a second junior.

About 11:30, the judges officially came by, though I'm sure that they had been by before making notes.
