ter. Please contact her with any questions. Treasurer:



BRING A TRAILER

About three years ago I bought this poor old 1962 Porsche 356 Karmann "notchback" with the idea we would build it into what is called an "Outlaw", which is Porsche lingo for a Restomod. 356 Outlaws are all the rage these days and good ones bring big mon-

ey. Anyway, life got in the way of the project (if you know what I mean) and we never got around to doing anything with it. How do you go about selling a hulk of a car, even if it is a Porsche? Bring A Trailer of course! If you are not familiar with Bringatrailer.com and you are a car nut, you should look into it. On the home page search "Porsche 356 project" to see what happened to mine.

After a long, two month period in which BAT vetted me and my car to the max, It went up for online auction for about a week. Throughout that week, the bids didn't exceed about \$7,000, although the snarky comments abounded! You might have



thought I was trying to sell a brand new 911! About an hour before the bidding was to close, things started to happen. Bids rolled in, with the buying bid at \$21,000. The car is truly worth more than that, but I am satisfied.

It turns out that the new owner is Rod Emory, of emorymotorsports.com, who is the uber guru of making super Outlaw Porsche's out of derelicts like mine. They sell for upwards of \$500,000. Rod is a truly nice guy who has found a niche and capitalized on it big time. He said he would keep me posted on the progress of my car, but I'm not going to lose sleep over it.
