Since Florida can still be very warm in April, May, September and October, we found ourselves almost always using the T-Bird for club outings, and I missed driving our Hudson and Hawk. So, one of them will very likely have an after-market AC system installed in the near future.



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

Cruising And Playing The Radio

Maybe it was Chuck Berry who best described the joy of driving an automobile when he sang, "Cruising and playing the radio. With no particular place to go." At least since WWII, the radio has been an integral part of the freedom offered to us by the automobile. In the early 1990s I tried to describe "cruising and playing the radio" to a visiting English friend, but he couldn't comprehend it. It was Friday night. So, we walked the few blocks from my house to downtown Lincolnton, N.C. where there were hundreds of teenagers cruising in their cars. This prompted two questions from the Englishman: "What is the purpose of all this?" and "Why do they play their radios so loud?" When I tried to explain that it was a unique part of American culture thanks to "freedom of the road", he smiled and said, "Well, all these young people sure seem to be enjoying themselves!"

I grew up "cruising and playing the radio". The year I was born was when the 45 rpm record was introduced by RCA Victor. The year I learned to drive the 8- track player was becoming the big thing. I still have a box of 8-track tapes in the garage, but the player hanging under the dash is long gone. Let's share some important events in our history of cruising and playing the radio: --In the 1920s and 1930s in-car radios were being introduced. They were expensive, adding about 25% to the price of a Model A. The top song of 1930 was "Happy Days Are Here Again". In 1952, even though practically all stations were broadcasting in AM, the first in-car FM radio became available thanks to Blaupunkt. The top song was "Blue Tango". In 1963 vacuum tubes were replaced with transistors and car radios became "solid state". The top song was "Surfin' USA".

In 1965 8-track players became available. Over the next several years 8-track players were added to many cars. The top song was "Wooly Bully". By 1969 cars added stereo to their sound system, where the tuner amplified two channels, not just one. The top song was "Sugar, Sugar". In 1970 companies like Alpine and Pioneer sought to solve our problem of the 8-track player eating up the tape with cassette tapes. With the advent of cassette tapes, we could now play "my music" thanks to a "Mix Tape". The top song was "Bridge Over Troubled Waters". By 1982 Bose offered the first Premium Stereo System teaming up with GM's Delco to offer it as an option in Oldsmobiles, Buicks, and Cadillacs. The top song was "Physical". By 1984 Sony introduced an in-dash CD player. The top song was "Careless Whisper".

Now, buttons and dials have been replaced by touch screens and Bluetooth. If you don't know what that is, ask your grandchildren. Then, take them on a cruise in your "old car". If it has a radio, let them turn it up loud...

July General Meeting—Gray Motorsports Museum By Bob Ridle

The July General Meeting took 34 TCVCC/AACA members and guests to a most

unique automotive museum, conceived by race car driver Johnny Gray.

After assembling in Hobe Sound, our caravan departed for the Gray Motorsports Museum in Jupiter. The private museum is housed in a mammoth new facility at the end of Capital Street in Jupiter, and houses an eclectic collection of vehicles, most of which were designed and built to do one thing...go really, really fast!





From 1918 forward, through the 20's and 30's to the more modern era, from dirt tracks to drag strips, to the 24 hours of Le Mans, if it was built for power, if it was built for speed, it has found a home at this museum. Each vehicle meticulously restored and on display, with more under restoration in the large shop areas.

Stutz, Dusenberg, Packard, GTO, Mustang, Corvette, Yenko Camaro, Hemi Cuda, Porsche, Shelby, and lots of modifieds too...woodies, custom trucks, and dragsters. All of them spread out in the Gray's spacious interior, with lots of room for future growth.

Vintage Cars on the Danube By Andre Rayman & Sally Franklin

Past presidents of the TCVCC- Sally Franklin, Andre Rayman, and their spouses Larry Atkins and Rosemary took a Viking river cruise on the Danube river from Budapest to Regensburg during the week of July 12-22,2024. As it is in our DNA, we kept an eye open for any and all classics and attempted to go to any classical car museums in the cities that we travelled to. We learned that museums tend to be closed on Monday and Tuesdays.

On our first day in Vienna Austria, we didn't see any actual classics, but we did see a variety of E-cars (Golf Carts) that were made to resemble the classics of years gone by. Unfortunately, we did not have time to ride around in them. We did get to see the Lippizans at the Spanish Riding School and ride in a horse-drawn buggy, though.






On our second day in Vienna, we visited the Vienna Military Museum and viewed the touring sedan which Franz Ferdinand was being driven in when he was assassinated

back in 1914 in Sarajevo. This

was the impetus for WW1. It is a Gräf & Stift luxury limousine. It's a *Double Phaeton* with engine number 287 It was purchased by Count Franz von Harrach, an officer of the Austrian army transport corps. The limousine was used to shuttle Archduke Franz Ferdinand around the Austro-Hungarian city of Sarajevo on June 28, 1914. This car is original right down to the bullet hole of the shot that killed his wife Sophie.



Vintage Cars on the Danube, continued...

In Passau, we ventured off into the countryside to a working farm that hosts weddings, brews beer, and does the Octoberfest style entertainment year-round. When we came outside, we encountered this 1972 Cadillac convertible. A short discussion with the owner indicated that the car had only been in the country for 3 months, and would be in his daughter's upcoming wedding.





Upon arrival in Regensburg, we commenced on a walking tour around the city, and in a very short distance, we encountered this Goggomobile. It was nicely restored to a bright red color and appeared to be driven fairly regularly.

Our second day in Nuremburg was the most intense classic car day of the trip. Our tour took us to the infamous zeppelin field which was the parade grounds for the Nazi regime in the

early 30's. It is often seen in documentaries showing marching soldiers and huge crowds of 150,000 and gigantic red banners. Here we encountered what appeared to be a classic VW show, though there were other non-VW participants





That afternoon, we took a short cab ride to the Merks Auto Museum. It has an extensive collection of cars (about 100 or more) motorcycles, bicycles, typewriters, cell phones, sewing machines, die cast cars, radios etc. If you are ever in Nuremburg, I highly recommend a trip to see this collection.
